

Maximizing the full potential of alcohol policy and accelerating action in Sweden, Europe, and the world

People want to lead healthy lives, protected from alcohol harm. People want to enjoy thriving communities that promote health and well-being. That's why support for alcohol policy is strong. In countries that have implemented evidence-based alcohol policy solutions - overcoming opposition of alcohol companies - people experience the benefits and support the policies. Country successes, people's support for ambitious alcohol policy, and growing recognition of the real harm caused by alcohol are all signs for the need to accelerate alcohol policy action as a public health priority:

- The World Health Assembly adopted a new **Global Alcohol Action Plan** in May 2022, the WHO European region followed up immediately by agreeing a groundbreaking new **Framework for Action on Alcohol** in September 2022,
- The European Commission included ambitious action on alcohol in the EU's Beating Cancer Plan in 2021, and
- Countries such as Lithuania, Estonia, Scotland, Ireland, and Norway are showing that **alcohol policy improvements are possible and that they bring substantial benefits to people**, communities, and societies overall.

With this background, IOGT-NTO and Movendi International, in collaboration with WHO Europe, and civil society partners NTAKK Lithuania, IOGT Poland, and Juvente Estonia are inviting to a 2-day mini conference to discuss the future of alcohol policy and chart an ambitious way forward to maximize the potential of alcohol policy for health, development, and economy.
